2021 ANNUAL REPORT

On behalf of Chief Stephen Scot Mayer, welcome to the Richwood Police Department's 2021 Annual Report. Contained within are the City of Richwood social harm statistics as well as police officer self-initiated activity numbers.

The Department faced many challenges in 2021, primarily at the hands of the Covid-19 Pandemic. Nevertheless, despite the repeated and long-lasting absence of several members of staff; to include the Chief of Police, the organization held firm and continued to do what it does best; ensuring, to the greatest degree possible, the safety and security of the citizens and visitors of Richwood, Texas.



The Richwood Police Department is a full service 24/7/365 public safety organization. We are composed of six (6) uniform patrol officers, two (2) police sergeants, one (1) criminal investigator, four (4) reserve police officers, and the chief of police.

Under the leadership of Chief Stephen Scot Mayer, the organization embraces a policing philosophy he has dubbed **Compliance B4 Accountability**. The philosophy stems from a Peelian principle which reads, "*Police must secure the willing cooperation of the public in voluntary observance of the law to be able to secure and maintain the respect of the public.*" This translates into the Police Department prioritizing and encouraging community awareness and conformity to the law. Chief Mayer believes aggressive enforcement of the law, through accountability measures, are to be utilized (with few exceptions) primarily when initial efforts to gain compliance of the law have proven unsuccessful. Although, law enforcement fell away from the practice of Peelian principles there is a new modern push to reembrace the philosophy. Chief Mayer takes great pride in the fact he has never strayed from pushing Peelian principles in any of the police departments he has acted as an administrator. But what does **Compliance B4 Accountability** look like in practice?

Richwood police officers are encouraged to focus on ways to assist the public in not breaking the law versus merely focusing on the handing out of accountability measures. Likewise, we believe in focusing on the ultimate goal of a project and using that as a guide in directing our compliance and enforcement efforts. For instance, we realize the traditional method of addressing speeding vehicles in a school zone is by means of a police officer, in an out-of-sight police cruiser, running radar, clocking violators, making traffic stops, and then issuing citations. Although this is a tried-and-true method, certainly a method of benefit, we go further and ask ourselves, "Is it the only method", "Is this the best method?", "Is there a more effective way?" If so, "What is it?".

Obviously, the ultimate goal of any police department, working traffic enforcement in a school zone, is to ensure the safety of the children. What could be more important than that? So, we asked ourselves, "What's better? An officer watching a motorist speed through a school zone, then chasing after the violator and issuing a citation, or an officer being so visible that motorists decide for themselves not to speed in the school zone. We believe the latter is the correct choice. We found, positioning a police cruiser, in a school zone, with an officer inside, running radar, while having the red and blue lights flashing, results, more times than not, in no speeding violations. That's right, no speeding motorists, and no speeding motorists means much safer children.

That is but one example, but that is what <u>Compliance B4 Accountability</u> is all about. It revolves around finding creative ways to encourage the public to not break the law. Chief Mayer has said many times over the years, "I believe if we were to ask any reasonable person what they would prefer, being a victim of a social harm and the police holding the violator accountable, or never being a victim at all, nearly all would say, "Never be a victim at all." That's our goal, to do what we can to encourage observance of the law. In doing so, we prevent victimization, we do not have to employ an accountability measure (which we're thrilled about), we get to provide the greatest level of safety we can, and we can live up to our motto of, "Policing done right!"

As an organization which embraces the Peelian Principles, we hold to a belief that police officers must do all that is possible to prevent crime and disorder. Two such Peelian principles state, *"To recognize always that the test of police efficiency is the absence of crime and disorder, and not the visible evidence of police action in dealing with them."* and *"The basic mission for which the police exist is to prevent crime and disorder"* We take this to mean if the organization is to be truly effective it must use all methods, within the law, to prevent social harms from occurring in Richwood. The organization accomplishes this effort primarily through tactical and strategic data analysis. Through strategic data analysis, the organization realizes long-term statistical trends, hot spots, and problems within the community. Through tactical data analysis, the department understands short-term series or patterns of social harms within the community. Both strategic and tactical data analysis provide an excellent foundation for effective preventative patrol tactics. It allows police officers to identify and address problems through focused patrol patterns within areas of town where social harms are most prevalent. Obviously, crime occurrence has a variety of socioeconomic causation factors, not all of which can be prevented by the police. Nevertheless, when possible, the organization makes a concerted effort toward social harm prevention.











2020 VIOLENT AND PROPERTY CRIME COMBINED



Violent crime is classified as Homicide, Sexual Assault, Robbery, and Aggravated Assault.





2021 VIOLENT AND PROPERTY CRIME COMBINED




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Combining violent and property crime provides a wholistic view of criminality in Richwood, Texas.



Looking at the categories of violent crime and property crime separately, we see the following trends emerge:

Violent crime increased by 11% in 2021 as compared to 2020.

So, what happened? The homicide rate remained unchanged. Sexual Assaults dropped by three (3) cases, but Aggravated Assaults climbed by four (4) cases. The increase was the results of a single event; a verbal disturbance, involving alcohol, at a residence, that turned violent, and involved weapons.






Property crime decreased by 43% in 2021 as compared to 2020.

Now that is good news by anyone's standards. Burglaries dropped by two (2) cases, Larceny/Theft cases dropped by twenty-nine (29), but Motor Vehicle Thefts increased by five (5) cases. So, this impressive reduction is mostly linked to a considerable reduction in larceny/theft cases.

VIOLENT CRIME YEAR TO YEAR COMPARISON 2020 - 2021






PROPERTY CRIME YEAR TO YEAR COMPARISON 2020 - 2021








CRASH STATISTICS






Those practitioners of social harm prevention tactics will relay, automobile crashes are the most difficult of all the social harms to prevent and reduce.

Recent studies, conducted in Texas, have revealed effective crash reduction is all about location, location, location. It is about the police being in the right area at the right time. In fact, a 10 percent decrease in police presence, at a particular location, results in a 2.1 to 3.5 percent increase in car accidents.

Some would say, "That's an easy fix. Just have police officers stay where the crashes are happening." But, what about the vehicle burglary issue going on in one neighborhood, or the larceny/theft issue going on at a particular convenience store, or the residential neighborhood plagued with vehicles speeding or running stop signs?

At the Richwood Police Department, we are doing our level best to use data to help us determine where to spend most of our preventative patrol time. Although, crashes have decreased since 2019, we would like to see more impactful reductions. As such, we continue to challenge staff to balance their patrol time; continuously aware of where they can be of the most usefulness.











Richwood Police Officer Self-Initiated Traffic Contacts







Total Calls for Service:

The Richwood Police Department answered a total of 2,377 calls for service in the year 2021.

#1 Call for Service


The number one call for service for Richwood Police Officers in 2021 were Disorderly Conduct complaints. The RWPD answered 270 disturbance calls in 2021.



The number two call for service for Richwood Police Officers in 2021 were Animal Complaints. The RWPD answered 225 animal complaint calls in 2021.

Note: As social harms decrease in Richwood so does calls for service. The Richwood Police Department answered sixty-nine (69) fewer calls for service in 2021 as compared to 2020 (2020: 2446, 2021: 2377)






Richwood Citizen/Visitor Calls for Service: Officer Breakdown








